raising corporate tax rates from 21% to 28% to pay for his infrastructure plan. Former Pres. Trump criticized the plan. The (re-)building of infrastructure fits into Biden's strategy for competition with China. WHO report published on the origins of Covid-19, from a team of 34 international experts, including many Chinese scientists. An animal intermediary is very likely, while a lab leak is extremely unlikely. Were there cases in other countries before Wuhan? Myanmar junta has killed 540+ protesters. Were Trump's tactics of tariffs but little confrontation and criticism, much personal praise of Xi Jinping better than what the new administration is doing? Why/why not? TOPIC 3: The Biden administration may rejoin the TPP (Trans-Pacific Partnership) and generally hopes to work with liberal (Western) democratic allies in policies towards the PRC. To what extent do these add up to a strategy of encirclement of China, and how worried should China be about this possibility?

*News from Wendy & Cassie: Vladimir Putin signed a bill to allow him to run for office again until 2036. He would be 84 by then. Good for Putin, but good for Russia? Is Putin a "benevolent dictator" (a good, strong but not democratic), a democratic leader (president), or a dictator with absolute power abused for his own personal interests.

Afghan Ministry of National Defense says it killed 157 terrorists in the past 24 hours. Peace talks have continued slowly since Sept., including many attacks by the Taliban, with the gov't also fighting the militants. Can two parties negotiate without an effective ceasefire?

- Your primary reasons for saying the U.S. wants to contain China is Trump's trade war. Is it really a trade war? A trade war is usually defined as escalating trade barriers raised in response to one another, repeatedly, and with the key of significantly reducing the volume of trade between two countries.
- *Accommodation, Engagement, & Containment from the U.S. perspective (recommended readings by Zhao, Watanabe). Consider clear, recent examples of North Korea & Iran.
- *What is the history of U.S. "policy paradigms" towards the PRC? Where do the three terms come from?
- The PRC was founded in 1949. Under the strategy of containment of communism, the USA did not

- recognize the new regime, instead continuing to recognize the KMT regime of Chiang Kaishek as "China".
- The USA began engagement with China (and recognition of the PRC regime) as a result of the Sino-Soviet Split. Pres. Richard Nixon led the change to engagement.
- In 1989 there was strong debate about whether the USA should disengage with China. Under Clinton, the USA gave China MFN status.
- To change to a policy paradigm of containment from one of engagement that has gone basically uninterrupted for the past several decades, what would have to happen? It would require full-scale disengagement: an end to the interdependence of our economies (decoupling), a sustained reduction in our interactions culturally, economically, and militarily (we would not cooperate and would even communicate much less.)

The main factor is the fear of the rising power. Ithe "trap" is real, the USA will go to war to prevent China from replacing it as the global hegemon.
*How would a war between China and the USA be different from past wars between "great powers"? We have nuclear weapons, the global economy is built around our interdependence, global hegemony would be at stake
"What kinds of policies towards China does it seem Allison supports? He says Xi understands the situation & mentions "the new model of great power relations" Xi proposed. Allison thinks the USA needs to accommodate China's rise to prevent war.
What does Waldron call such policies, and what would he prefer?

- *Introduction paragraphs: An introduction paragraph should introduce the topic of the essay. In doing so, the paragraph should 1. make the reader interested (tell why it is important if it's not obvious), 2. give the thesis statement of the essay.
- If the topic is unfamiliar or esoteric, an introduction paragraph may also give background information.

What are some different ways to get the reader interested in your essay's topic within the first sentence or so?

The first sentence of an essay should have a "hook" (something to inerest, entice, or attract the reader). It should attract, entice, or otherwise "hook" the reader like a fish.

For our original research or our own editorials not written for course assignments, we ourselves are likely to be interested in the topic already.

However, others and most readers may either know nothing about the topic, not be interested, or even find the topic boring.

Do our essays for this course need a hook or not?

A hook at the beginning of an essay may...

- *Language in metaphysical, ontological discourse: Correspondence (Realism, Liberalism w/ positivist or post-positivist methodologies): what we talk about refers & corresponds to things which are real Vs. Coherence (Constructivism w/ interpretive methodologies): study discourses b/c the "things" we talk about are reified rather than real. We should try to be coherent in our discourses and avoid internal, logical contradictions (what we say needs to "make").

- permanent its influence. Acts of hypocrisy may be necessary, but they reduce the order's legitimacy.

Topic Sentence Pageant: As a team, give the following incomplete paragraphs a topic sentence. Your instructor will select the most "beautiful" one (best "fit", attractive, creative, grammatically perfect, and concise) as the winner.

- 1. Our economies remain very much interdependent. China and the USA still share many common national interests, like resolving the Korean Peninsula conflict peacefully and re-establishing legitimate governance in Myanmar (Burma). Finally, as the world's two strongest nations, the USA and China bear the heaviest responsibilities for providing "global public goods" in general, as well as leading "collective action" to address climate change and prevent the proliferation of nuclear weapons.
- 2. Realism has lost much credibility since failing to predict the peaceful conclusion of the Cold War. Furthermore, our inability to agree on the world's current polarity combined with a debate on whether a hegemonic order or balanced power will be more peaceful reduce Realism's practical utility. Liberalism depends on the strength of int'l institutions whose strength, independence, and relevance are questionable, especially with the apparent decline of the U.S.-led "liberal world order" and apparent intolerance of illiberal regimes. Radical constructivists question whether anything about the world "as we know it" is true or real, often preferring to criticize other theoretical approaches rather than putting forward policy prescriptions. And feminist IR? Most scholars seem content

to continue ignoring it, perpetuating patriarchy, the main global problem feminists want to eliminate.

When you receive a new paper strip, only look at the most recent addition (whether a drawing OR text). Below the drawing, write another sentence or phrase

that describes it. (What is in the drawing, and what is happening?)
